- Ensure all coaches are appropriately qualified and have training in First Aid.
- Provide the opportunity for every young person's voice to be heard.
- Adhere to IMAC anti-bully policy.

Members, Parents/Guardians are expected to:

- Treat all members, instructors, and management with respect.
- (Members) To give your best in your martial arts training.
- (Guardians) Drop off and collect young people at agreed times and locations.
- (Guardians) Support the Coaches in running the club in line with Club Policy.

Takemusu Aikido Society (TAS) provides various sporting activities and opportunities for young people through participation in clubs, regional and international events.

Section 2. Principles to safeguard children from harm

TAS is committed to safeguarding children and by working under the guidance of IMAC Safeguarding Policies our staff, both volunteers and employed, working with our young people, throughout the organisation, seek to create a safe environment for young people to grow and develop martial arts. All of our instructors have completed Garda Vetting and required Safeguarding courses where appropriate. The following set of principles should be adhered to:

- Importance of childhood The importance of childhood should be understood and valued by everyone involved in sport.
- Needs of the child All children's sport experiences should be guided by what is best for children. This means that adults should have a basic understanding of the emotional, physical and personal needs of young people.
- Integrity in relationships Adults interacting with children in sport are in a position of trust and influence. They should always ensure that children are treated with integrity and respect, and the self-esteem of young people is enhanced.
- Fair Play All children's sport should be conducted in an atmosphere of fair play. The principles of fair play should always be emphasised, and organisers should give clear guidelines regarding acceptable standards of behaviour.
- Quality atmosphere & ethos Children's sport should be conducted in a safe, positive and encouraging atmosphere.
- Equality All children should be valued and treated in an equitable and fair manner regardless of ability, age, gender, religion, social and ethnic background or political persuasion.
